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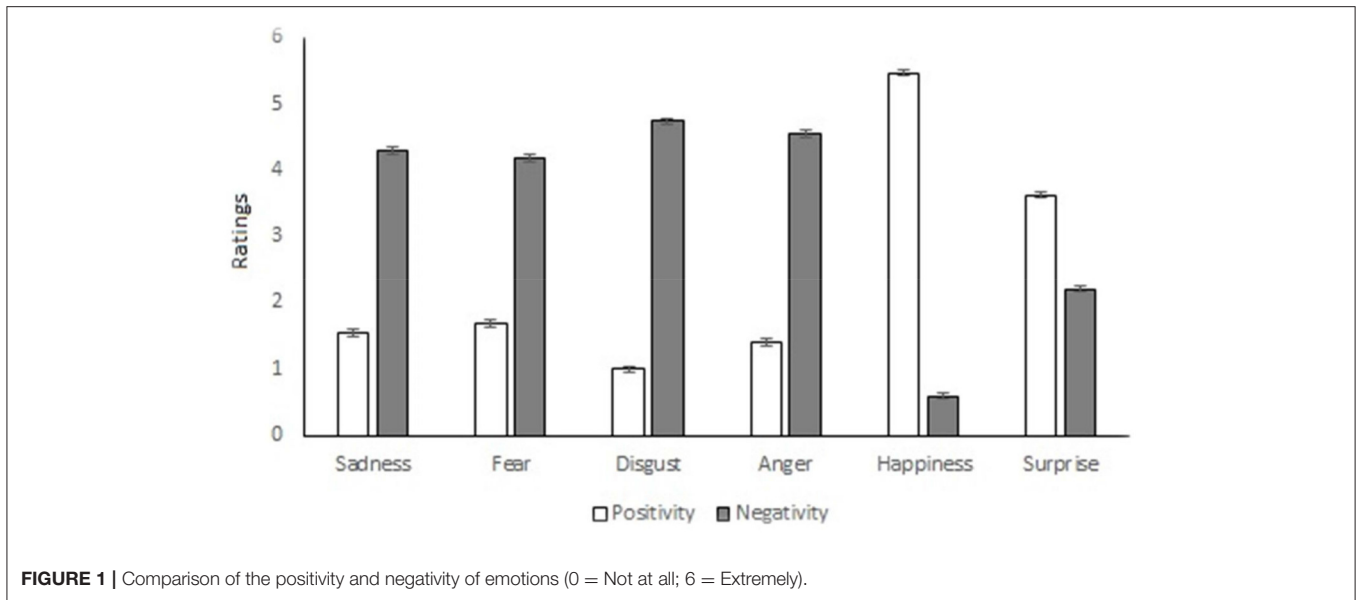


FIGURE 1 | Comparison of the positivity and negativity of emotions (0 = Not at all; 6 = Extremely).
